They have also welcomed many young preachers, giving them a chance to preach before they begin pastoring their own flocks.

Until recently, the church was always open day and night for anyone to drop by. For many in the community, it was part of their daily activities to come by the church and get some exercise, walking in the church.

That changed when someone stole the church's heating stove. The congregation had been trying to make improvements to the building and, with that theft, they to replace the heating system along with other improvements. Bough pastors needy in Stockton area church

What do you do when life takes an unexpected twist like a disability? If you are Pastor Ladena Bough, you thank God for the new opportunities He has given you.

Pastor Bough was content leading a Bible study and managing a law office in Kansas City, but God clearly had other plans for her. After becoming disabled, she moved back to Stockton, Missouri.

"I am blessed to have 24 hours a day available," she says. "Many pastors in the area work full-time jobs and do not have the freedom I do." In addition to pastoring a small congregation, she ministers one-on-one to members of the entire community. She is available to the needy throughout the area. She visits shut-ins and nursing home patients regularly and is just a phone call away for anyone else who needs her. She uses her legal background to help Medicare and Medicaid patients navigate the system to make sure they receive all available benefits. She has researched and contacted drug companies that help low-income people get their medications at low cost or even free. She also has helped people who need food, but who have an illegal drug record, get food through a local food bank. In Missouri, a drug conviction permanently precludes the convict from receiving food stamps.

Pastor Bough is well known throughout Stockton. She has pastored the small congregation of Independence Church since 2012, but she was familiar with the church long before that. Her great-grandfather dedicated the church in 1916 and an uncle was also a pastor of the church. Bough's husband, Bill, also had an uncle who pastored the church.

Coronavirus brings fear over faith

How many times have we been told, "It's for the common good?" Incidentally, haven't we all been persuaded to believe it's more efficient and productive to globalize services, products and people? What would you think if that exact procedure was used in history with horrific results. Well, maybe now, with the coronavirus pandemic condition upon us, listening might make sense. Moreover, what if there is comfort in knowing a Christian response.

The coronavirus is pandemic because of public transportation. In fact, it would likely not even be endemic if public transportation ceased. Worldwide public transportation by air and sea makes every spot on the earth vulnerable to diseases. Maybe there is a reason why there is a separation of peoples by language and a separation of peoples into separate land masses called continents. I wonder what book touches on this separation issue and its purpose.

When we look through time at endemic and pandemic diseases from the Dark Ages, 476-1453 AD, to polio in 1952-1979 certain common factors applied. The greater the connection of people the greater the presence of the disease. The only thing which seemed to work short of a vaccination was migration and lack of connection. People in the Dark Ages fled the centralized areas for rural subsistence living. This was not uncommon to their previous life conditions but in this circumstance with much fewer people in connection.

Polio was heavily related to children in the USA. However, from that entry, adults suffered greater harm than children. Children suffered paralysis in one in 1000 cases while adults one in 75 cases. The disease required drastic actions many of which we see again today. However, the overriding assumption seems to be the greater the connection the greater is the exposure to endemic and pandemic disease.

Globalism, whether its mass transportation between continents or worldwide international transportation, both seem to magnify the issues involved with new disease outbreaks. This is one of the heavy prices of globalism. The only comfort we can have short of a constant flow of miracle vaccinations is the comfort of Jesus. He offered Himself, provided the healing of communion and the peace of knowing we will have eternal life. As simple as this may appear millions today choose "fear over faith," and live each day in despair and not in the joy of Jesus' love.

Home Safe Now Virus Traps Eversen Daughter in Europe

Grace Eversen, the teenage daughter of Bishop Dennis and Sylvia Eversen, was on a trip to Spain, visiting a friend whose parents are missionaries there. The girls anticipated spending time together visiting tourist sights in Spain. But shortly after Grace arrived, coronavirus began making headlines in both Spain and the United States. Instead of sightseeing, the girls spent two days together, locked down in her hosts' residence.

Soon, it became clear that Grace either had to leave Spain before the border was closed or spend the duration of the health crisis in Spain. Naturally, the Eversens wanted their daughter home. Prayer requests went out and many in Acts Ministry as well as others in the body of Christ began to pray for her quick return.

The fact that Grace was still a minor complicated matters. Dennis contacted the airline that she had booked with on line. He was transferred to other airlines, but there simply did not seem to be a way to get her back home. Meanwhile, Sylvia and a neighbor visited the airport in Springfield. Their friends in Spain were

also trying to help and they called Sylvia just as she was leaving the airport. They asked a question Sylvia couldn't answer, so they turned around and went back into the airport to find an answer. The airline worker at the desk was usually assigned to that position, but, ultimately, she was able to help them.

Grace went through multiple busy airports on her way home and came in contact with many people. She was tested at the airports and exhibited symptoms that could have been the virus. When she arrived home, the health department retested her and the family self-quarantined at home. When they received the test results March 24, she tested negative for the coronavirus.

The relieved family believes that God answered their prayers and that it was only through His grace that Grace was able to get home. Also, Dennis says, those simple things like staying a distance apart and washing your hands really do help. He says she practiced social distancing and hand washing as much as possible through all of the airports on her journey back.
